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## Introduction

Sustainable Development Technology Canada (SDTC) is pleased to submit to the Minister of Innovation, Science and Industry, for tabling in Parliament, its annual report on the administration of the *Access to Information Act* for the reporting period commencing April 1, 2023, and ending March 31, 2024. This report is submitted in accordance with section 72 of the *Act*.

The *Access to Information Act* took effect on July 1, 1983. The ATIA gives Canadian citizens, permanent residents, any person, and corporation present in Canada a right of access to information contained in government records, subject to certain specific and limited exceptions.

## Who we are

Sustainable Development Technology Canada (SDTC) helps Canadian companies develop and deploy sustainable technologies by delivering critical funding support and promoting the development of a robust Canadian ecosystem that supports innovation. We do this by:

- Funding the development and demonstration of new environmental technologies
- Fostering and encouraging collaboration among organizations in the private sector, academia, the not-for-profit sector and others to develop and demonstrate new technologies
- Promoting the timely diffusion of new technologies across key economic sectors in Canada

As an independent federal foundation and flagship program, our funding of Canadian entrepreneurs has created jobs, growth, and long-term prosperity for Canada. Since inception, SDTC has invested over \$1.53 billion in Canadian companies who have created nearly 21,000 jobs and are generating \$3.1 billion in annual revenues. Our companies have reduced greenhouse gas emissions by an estimated 22.6 megatonnes annually, equivalent to taking almost 7 million cars off the roads every year.

Governance and oversight of the Foundation's activities are provided by an independent, 15-member Board of Directors made up of private and not-for-profit sector leaders from across Canada with a broad range of experience and expertise. This Board oversight includes accountability for the management of the Foundation's financial matters, strategic direction, and business affairs. 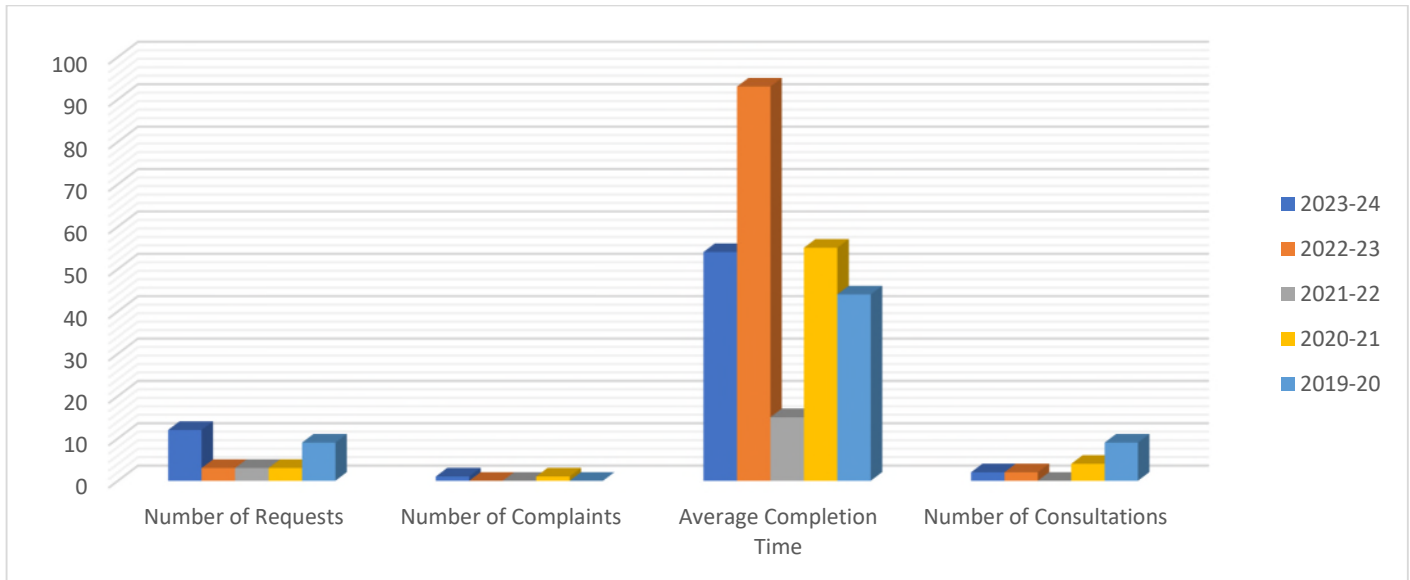
## Access to Information activities

The Chief Operation Officer is the designated head of the institution for the *Access to Information Act*. The COO, with support from the VP People & Technology, is responsible for the development, coordination and implementation of effective policies, guidelines, systems, and procedures to enable efficient processing of requests under the *Access to Information Act*. The ATIP office consists of one ATIP Coordinator and relies on the advice and guidance of consultants and legal advisors on an as needed basis.

The activities of the Access to Information and Privacy office include:

- Processing requests under the *Act*;
- Developing and maintaining policies, procedures and guidelines to ensure the *Act* is respected by the institution;
- Promoting awareness of the *Act* to ensure SDTC's responsiveness to the obligations imposed on the government;
- Monitoring SDTC's compliance with the *Act*, regulations and relevant procedures and policies;
- Preparing annual reports to Parliament and other statutory reports, as well as other material that may be required by central agencies;
- Representing SDTC in dealings with the Treasury Board Secretariat (TBS), the Information Commissioner and other government funds and agencies regarding the application of the *Act* as they relate to SDTC; and
- Supporting SDTC in meeting its commitments in relation to greater openness and transparency through proactive disclosure of information and the disclosure of information through informal avenues.

## Interpretation of Access to Information statistical reports



From the above statistical analysis comparing this fiscal to the past three, SDTC’s number of incoming requests and complaints has increased and average completion time has gone down.

During the reporting period, SDTC received twelve Access to Information requests, 10 of which were closed during this reporting period. SDTC received one complaint during this reporting period. We are working closely with the Office of the Information Commissioner (OIC) to address the complaint files that remain open. Between 2015 and 2024, SDTC received a total of 47 complaints. Of these, 33 complaints were discontinued, two (2) complaints were not well founded and resolved, and nine (9) complaints were well founded and resolved. Three (3) complaints are with the Office of the Information Commissioner of Canada, awaiting a decision.

There was one formal training session conducted during the reporting period. The training session was a mix of new employee onboarding and ATIP refreshers for existing staff.

No audits were conducted during the reporting period.

No new institution-specific access to information related policies, guidelines or procedures were implemented in the institution during the reporting period.

For 2023-2024, the costs directly associated with the administration of the *Access to Information Act* are estimated at \$79,638.00.

## Proactive Disclosure Requirements

The ATIP team works in collaboration with departmental officials to fulfill the proactive publication legislative requirements found in Part 2 of the Access to Information Act. Sections 74 to 78 and 82 to 88 of Part 2 of the ATIA, stipulate that government entities that support a minister, are required to publish proactively travel expenses, hospitality expenses, reports tabled in parliament, reclassification of positions, contracts, grants and contributions, briefing materials, and expense reports. Within Sustainable Development Technologies Canada, this responsibility falls to the Communications & Ecosystems team, the Corporate Services and Finance Team, the People and Culture Team, and the Investments Team, in collaboration with the ATIP Team. Executives within each Branch regularly monitor their compliance to ensure the accuracy and completeness of proactively published information.
